<b>Module Aims</b>
To provide you with a critical framework which situates and explores the development and continuing impacts of 'race' and ethnicity across the globe. The module will also cover knowledge which enables you to understand theoretical and conceptual debates within the sociology of racism and ethnicity, thus deepening understanding of racism, inequality and diversity.

<b>Outline Syllabus</b>
This module will focus on different approaches and theories which explore the historical and contemporary understandings of race and ethnicity. You will engage with a diverse range of topics such as the scientific/biological, cultural and institutional forms of racism; the history and practice of representation; the impact of changes in immigration and race relations legislation; the discourses around multiculturalism and social cohesion.

3	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>a) use oral and written skills to communicate ideas to others;</li> <li>b) use information technology to identify relevant research literature and to produce appropriate dissemination/communication materials (group presentation);</li> <li>c) develop your critical thinking skills when exploring the subject matter as identified through research literature and other relevant sources;</li> <li>d) apply theory and academic learning to real world contexts;</li> <li>e) work as a part of a team within deadlines in order to achieve a set goal.</li> </ul>

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>You will be introduced to and explore a selection of relevant content (issues, themes and theories) in the study of race and ethnicity through interactive lectures. Screenings and discussions are also used in order to enhance your critical thinking skills and capacity to analyse sociological phenomena (LO's 1a-b, 2a-e, 3a,c-e). In addition, you will undertake some guided research in order to contribute to large and small group discussions (LO's 1b, 2a-e) and to support your assessments. This will be by means of time set aside during the lecture sessions to develop groups and initiate group discussions. The range of assessments will assess all learning outcomes (LO's 1a-b, 2a-e, 3a-e). In particular, the group presentation component will require you to select and develop your chosen topic through academic research and applying research/theory to real world examples. In addition, through the presentation component you will demonstrate your team working, time management, written and oral communication skills. Your presentation will take place during the final lecture sessions. The multiple choice exam will enable you to demonstrate a broad understanding of the subject matter as explored throughout the module. You will be offered the opportunity to sit a mock examination during one of the later lectures in order to assess your formative learning.</p>
