Sessions will be delivered online in first instance, but may be brought on campus dependent on prevailing conditions at a time.</p> <p>An assessed portfolio is used to identify learning needs and develop reflective practice. Presentation skills will be assessed by staff and during directed study hours, you are expected to undertake reflective practice to complete your portfolio, undertake group-work for the group assignment and to research and produce an essay evaluating an aspect of forensic investigative methods.</p>
