Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>The module uses a blended approach to support learning and achievement. Students will engage with a series of weekly 3-hour on-campus and/or online workshops. These will include face-to face or online delivery that addresses the key concepts, issues of practical application and includes a set of structured learning activities (eg, discussion of pre-read academic materials) that 'scaffold' the learning. There is also a formative assignment that generates feedback on progress. These sessions will support students to apply learning to real world scenarios.</p> <p>The module will be assessed through coursework which will have two distinct parts: the first part will be aimed to test the ability of students independently to research and evaluate banking law. This part will focus on international aspects of banking law. The second part will have a more practical focus, inviting students to provide legal advice on real-world issues arising in the context of UK banking. In this way the assessments aim to cover the whole range of knowledge expected to be achieved in the module.</p> <p>Oral feedback will be given in the class and opportunities for written feedback will be provided. Tutors will be available to meet you individually, if requested, to discuss further feedback opportunities and review your progress. Formative exercises within the sessions will prepare you for the summative assessments.</p>
