Module Aims
<p>To promote critical insight into common conflict engagement roles, methods and processes, and the questions and critiques surrounding them;</p> <p>To develop skills in conflict assessment and process design and planning, including analysis of ethical considerations in conflict intervention.</p>

Outline Syllabus
<p>The module will be organised around key areas of practice - e.g. negotiation - with each providing introductions to relevant research and scholarship, case-studies and intervention scenarios, problem-based and/or simulation exercises and facilitated reflection providing a mix of theoretical and practical learning.</p>

01	Explain the features of and theoretical assumptions in a range of methods and processes for conflict engagement, including negotiation, mediation and dialogue.
02	Critically evaluate past/existing intervention processes at different scales, and in different social/cultural contexts.
03	Justify the selection and use of relevant methods/processes for conflict intervention, drawing on analysis of needs and issues in different conflict situations and learning from past interventions.
04	Identify and evaluate relevant ethical issues and dilemmas surrounding conflict intervention, including issues of gender and conflict sensitivity.
05	Create process designs for conflict scenarios, addressing different needs or issues.
06	Identify progress in the development of practical skills for the management, resolution or transformation of conflict.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>The module will involve a mixture of learning methods, including lectures, seminars, practical workshops and simulation exercises. There will be a significant emphasis on applied and active learning, with students working through relevant exercises associated with the design and management of conflict interventions. This activity will be supported by guided engagement with relevant scholarship and research, to develop critical insights into the opportunities for and challenges surrounding constructive engagement with conflict.</p> <p>Formative assessment will include a number of tasks designed to build your ability to achieve the LOs for this module.</p> <p>Summative assessment will be through a portfolio of 3800-4200 words, plus supporting evidence of learning, consisting of various types of assessment designed to evaluate your achievement of the LOs for this module. The portfolio must include: an essay evaluating the strengths and weaknesses of a past or existing peace intervention; a reflection on a collaboratively produced process design for a case study of conflict; and a reflection on skills learning.</p>
