The concepts, principles and mechanisms underlying this regime as well as the interrelationship between industrial activities, and in particular energy policy and climate change will form a key part of the module.</p>

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy
<p>A range of methods will be adopted to direct and support learning on this module through a blended learning format. You will attend a weekly 2 hour workshop. For each of the workshops you will be asked to carry out some preparatory work which will include reading articles, book chapters and primary legal materials. Your preparation will also include independently researching questions set. During the workshops there will be some lecturer input and you will be asked to discuss your preparation and work in groups or individually to critique additional materials, debate questions and analyse primary law. There will be follow up work after most workshops to consolidate your learning and help you develop the criticality required at this level. Your work will be supported by the use of the Virtual Learning Environment where you will find relevant materials. Students who persistently do not complete the pre reading will have a support plan put in place</p> <p>Formative exercises will be made available to help you better prepare for the summative assessment. Oral feedback will be given in the class and opportunities for written feedback will be provided. Tutors will be available to meet you individually if requested to discuss further feedback opportunities and review your progress.</p> <p>Assessment will be by coursework only. This will comprise a presentation based on a case study and a written coursework of 2500 words or equivalent. You will be required to undertake a critical analysis of a complex issues in this field applying the principles and law studied in the module. The coursework will require the use of independent research, critical and analytical skills. You will also be expected to use appropriate legal terminology and written communication. The summative assessment is aimed at testing your ability to meet the learning outcomes of the module. This involves producing a considered piece of work that accurately uses the law in regards to a conflict.</p>
