Module Aims
<p>This module will provide a theoretical underpinning to enable you to deconstruct the various forms of regulatory theory within a legal context. Three key questions will be initially discussed to enable a broad foundation to be established:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> (1) Is regulation necessary at all? (2) What approach to regulation should be adopted? and (3) What should the regulatory architecture be comprised of. <p>From these deceptively simple questions a number of key themes will be explored including but not limited to the approaches based on risk, better, public choice, public interest and responsive based regulation. This module aims to provide an understanding of the legal challenges and the key issues regarding the theory and practice of regulation. Students will develop a critical understanding of the regulatory approaches and frameworks in which disputes are resolved.</p>

Outline Syllabus

The syllabus will introduce and provide a rationale in relation to the main themes behind regulation. Regulation will be considered initially under the umbrella of the following definition: "The employment of legal instruments for the implementation of social-economic policy objectives". A characteristic of legal instruments is that individuals or organizations can be compelled by government to comply with prescribed behavior under penalty of sanctions.

Once these foundations have been laid, the following topics will be subsequently explored:

- * The general theories of regulation,
- * institutional regulation,
- * sanctions and context,
- * positive and normative theories of regulation,
- * formulating and implementing regulation,
- * the creation and implementation of regulatory policy,
- * the cost of compliance.

Learning, Teaching and Assessment Strategy

All sessions are delivered online using digital legal resources and appropriate learning technologies. The Virtual Learning Environment (VLE) for each module is the hub of knowledge through which all module materials are accessed and where a big part of student work takes place.

The module will be delivered over 12 weeks 6 of which will include synchronous learning and 6 asynchronous.

Synchronous learning, which involves student interaction with module lecturers and tutors, includes 4 2-hour "live" weekly seminars focusing on delivering content, clarifying issues on the law topics, and discussing answers to student tasks. Two additional 2-hour synchronous seminars will focus on the design of and preparation for the summative assessment, module revision, and the collection and review of student feedback which will be used to improve module delivery.

Some of the sessions will be student-led presentations. Drawing on primary and secondary sources, you will complete research and presentation exercises.

The six weeks of asynchronous learning include a mix of learning activities such as pre-recorded online presentations or talks on a particular topic, links to relevant videos and online resources and lists of questions and tasks for self-study. You can watch the presentations, videos and work on the answers and tasks at your own time.

You will be set tasks to monitor your progress, in addition to formal assessment. All teaching will be supported by information supplied on the virtual learning environment, Canvas. Directed study will be provided to enable you to work towards the final summative assessments.
