This module supports international students in developing advanced academic English and study skills required for success in final-year undergraduate study. Students refine their ability to read complex texts, write extended assignments, give confident presentations and engage critically with academic sources. The module emphasises independent learning, research, and effective communication in academic and professional contexts. Through structured tasks and formative feedback, students gain the linguistic competence and study strategies needed to meet Level 6 expectations and future employability goals.

The overall expected hours may include contact time, scheduled learning activity, directed and independent study and any minimum expectations for placement learning. Most learning at the University of Bradford has some online content and sessions which are delivered fully by virtual means are labelled as "online".

Assessment is designed to reflect the integrated nature of academic English and to prepare students for the expectations of final-year undergraduate study. The module includes four evenly weighted components: listening and reading exams, a written assignment and an oral presentation. These assessments test students' ability to understand academic input, construct and support arguments in writing, and communicate ideas effectively in spoken form.

Formative assessment is embedded throughout the module, with regular practice tasks, peer feedback and tutor guidance provided during workshops and tutorials. Draft writing, mock exams and practice presentations help students to monitor their progress and refine their skills before submission. Feedback focuses on accuracy, fluency, structure and the use of academic conventions. Referral assessments mirror the original formats and offer a second opportunity to meet the learning outcomes.

Assessment in this module is designed to develop and evaluate students' proficiency in academic English across all four key skills: reading, writing, listening and speaking. All assessment components are marked on a Pass/Fail basis, and students must pass all components to successfully complete the module. Each assessment tests a specific language skill aligned with CEFR B2+ (IELTS 6.0+).

* The listening exam tests students' ability to follow extended academic discourse, identify key ideas and supporting detail, and take accurate notes - skills essential for lectures and seminars.

* The reading exam assesses comprehension of academic texts, including structure, argumentation and synthesis

* The written assignment enables students to demonstrate their ability to construct and support arguments in extended written form, incorporating referencing, source integration and academic conventions.

* The oral presentation develops and tests spoken fluency, organisation of ideas and the ability to communicate effectively with an academic audience.

Formative assessment is embedded throughout the module, with practice tasks, tutor feedback and peer review supporting students' preparation. Draft writing, mock exams and rehearsals build confidence and promote reflective learning.

Assessments in this module are marked on a Pass/Fail basis, and students must pass all four components (reading, writing, listening and speaking) to successfully complete the module. While no numerical marks are awarded, the assessments are aligned with CEFR and IELTS equivalencies to support student understanding of their English proficiency. A pass in each component indicates performance at CEFR B2+, broadly equivalent to IELTS 6.0 or above, which is the minimum level required for progression to Level 6 study at the University of Bradford.

Where appropriate, referral assessments may be scheduled during the module rather than at the end. For instance, if a student fails a Term 1 component, the resit can be arranged in Term 2. Referral assessments follow the same formats to ensure consistency and fairness in meeting learning outcomes.
