This module will provide you with an introduction to the theory and practice of project management and looks in turn at each stage of the project life cycle from initiation and planning to execution, control and closure.

You will consider the nature of projects and how different methodologies (approaches) and project management tools and techniques can be used to manage the complexities, the uncertainties and the risks that are an integral part of all projects.

Ethical issues in project management

Throughout the module, students will be encouraged and expected to reflect on their personal or professional experience of projects and to reflect on the way that different cultures and values might shape approaches to project and project management.

## BIC6002-A module learning, teaching and assessment

Groups are small and classes are student-centred and interactive.

The classroom approach is explicitly designed to help international students acquire new knowledge and skills, to build their confidence and enable them to become more independent learners. By doing this consistently and across all modules, the programme provides them with a strong foundation for further study in their chosen subject area.

The approach is inclusive and recognises that students come from different backgrounds with a range of previous learning experiences and associated expectations, beliefs and behaviours. Teaching and learning methods are clearly explained so students understand why (where appropriate) they need to engage in new ways of learning and why those they have used or relied on up to this point may be less suited to supporting their ongoing development and their chances of success in UK Higher Education.

Formative work is an integral part of the approach. In class, students are set tasks that require them to apply their knowledge and skills, to think critically and solve problems. The level of challenge is gradually increased as the students grow in confidence and Tutors help them to see that experimentation, trial and error are central to the learning process, providing constructive feedback on both what has been achieved and how.

Formative tasks specific to this module and which will help to prepare the students for their coursework assignment will require them to research and evaluate the success (or otherwise) of a number of real-world projects, reflecting on the extent to which the planning or delivery reflected best practice project management approaches.

As the summative assessment is a piece of extended written work, students will need to reflect on the research and writing skills that they are developing and practising in parallel in their English for Master's Preparation module, but they will also get additional practise focused on the writing process (POWER) and subskills such as referencing and integrating sources and source material.

Students are also expected to engage in independent study, to reflect on their own performance and to discuss this with their module tutor or personal academic tutor, who will provide support and advice and, when necessary, draw the attention of Module and Programme Leads to a struggling student using the 'Students of concern' process.

Summative assessment is an essay where students are expected to demonstrate their understanding of key project management principles, tools and techniques or a report evaluating and explaining the success or otherwise of a real-world project.
